# 1.1.3 South Africa's business leaders delaying business expansion and putting off investments due to increasing economic and political uncertainty in the country

On 13 March, *TMG Digital* reported that Grant Thornton's International Business Report shows that SA's executives are delaying business expansion and putting off investments due to 'turbulence.'<sup>3</sup>

# 1.1.4 S&P Global reiterates concerns over South Africa's weak economic growth, political tensions and policy reform

On 14 March, *Eyewitness News* reported that Standard & Poor's Global (S&P) ratings has reiterated its concerns about weak economic growth, political tensions and policy reform in South Africa.<sup>4</sup>

#### 1.1.5 South Africa's manufacturing sector continues to underperform amid slow economic growth

On 14 March, *Fin24* reported that manufacturing production was up 0.8% in January 2017, but this is still below levels of productions recorded before the global financial market crisis, according to Statistics South Africa which released data on manufacturing production on Tuesday.<sup>5</sup>

# 1.1.8 South Africa's retail sector remains under pressure as long as consumer confidence remains depressed

# 1.1.9 South Africa's four major food manufacturers, Pioneer Foods, Premier Foods, Foodcorp and Tiger Brands, caught up in a major price fixing cartel scandal

On 16 March, *IOL Business* reported that a small white maize milling firm has been fined R10.1 million after being bullied into participating in a price fixing cartel by Pioneer Foods, Premier Foods, Foodcorp and Tiger Brands, the four major firms operating in this market.<sup>9</sup>

### 1.2.3 Water restrictions officially lifted in Gauteng, however, Water and Sanitation Department urges residents not to waste water as South Africa is still experiencing drought conditions

# 1.2.6 City of Johannesburg bans summer watering in an effort to promote a culture of water conservation despite the recent rains that filled have up Gauteng dams

On 14 March, *TMG Digital* reported that despite the summer rains that filled up Gauteng dams, Nico de Jager, MMC for the Environment and Infrastructure Services Department, said on Tuesday that the city would only partially lift water restrictions in an effort to promote a culture of water conservation.<sup>16</sup>

### 1.2.7 South Africa's Water and Sanitation Minister Nomvula Mokonyane calls for the introduction of rain harvesting system for government buildings

On 14 March, *Eyewitness News* reported that Water and Sanitation Minister Nomvula Mokonyane says she has proposed to cabinet that the government introduce British America Tobacco (BAT)'s rain water harvesting system for government buildings.<sup>17</sup>

On 17 March, *Bloomberg* reported that the crown jewel of South Africa's tourism industry, Cape Town has 100 days before it runs out of water.<sup>20</sup>

# 2.0 Daily Infographics: Climate change means more demand for the Earth's limited supply of fresh water




Figure 1. Climate change means more demand for the Earth's limited supply of fresh water (Source: World Bank Group)

#### 3.0 Overall Assessment

- Slow growth and increasing political uncertainty becoming a major threat to food security in South Africa
- The land debate in South Africa rages on without any clear strategic direction on the country's land reform process
- ❖ The drought in Western Cape Province worsens as the water crisis in Cape Town deepens with no clear policy solution from the key stakeholders
- The price fixing cartel scandal involving South Africa's four major food manufacturers, namely, Pioneer Foods, Premier Foods, Foodcorp and Tiger Brands threatens the food security of low-income households in South Africa. Therefore, the government of South Africa is urged to address the oligopolistic character of the food manufacturing sector.
